




# CITY OF SHREVEPORT CRIME SINCE 1970

includes Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Assault, Burglary, Theft, and Auto Theft




# VIOLENT CRIME IN SHREVEPORT SINCE 1970

In addition to the Part 1 Crimes above, SPD took 15,762 Part 2 crime reports. Included offenses were reported to SPD in 2016. Offenses counted do not include unfounded incidents. The homicide count includes justifiable homicides. Five homicides were deemed justified through investigation and district attorney decision. Justifiable homicides are not included in the numbers published by the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program.

SPD communications officers handled each one of these calls. SPD maintains a force of over 40 communications officers stationed at the Caddo 911 building to answer calls for service within the boundaries of the city 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



Louisiana Chapter of the Association of Public Safety Communications Officials recognized SPD communications officers with special artwork in 2016.

*The Shreveport Police Department classifies and reports its criminal statistics according to the UCR program, administered by the FBI. The UCR program helps FBI and local law enforcement agencies gauge crime fluctuations nationwide. Over 16,000 agencies participate in this program. To keep the data consistent throughout these agencies, the FBI sets up guidelines for classifying and submitting data. This enables the different agencies to compare each other and to rank areas according to their crime.*

## TOOLS AVAILABLE TO THE DEPARTMENT



SPD employs both modern and more traditional means of policing within the city. The horse mounted patrol operates mainly in the downtown area, but this unit is an integral part of SPD's Mardi Gras security team.



SPD also uses bicycles as a way to patrol trouble spots in some neighborhoods while connecting more closely with the community.



SPD's Lake Patrol has jurisdiction on Cross Lake and the lake at C. Bickham Dickson Park. In addition to enforcing laws on the lakes, SPD helps with search and rescue. Lake Patrol's offices at 2900 Municipal Pier Road provide the required permits to operate a watercraft on either lake.



SPD's Field Support Bureau maintains eight motorcycles that are used for traffic control, official ceremonies, and leading parades such as Mardi Gras. SPD has five officers assigned to ride motorcycles as part of their regular duties. Additional officers within the department also maintain the certification to operate the motorcycles.



SPD's K-9 Unit is a force multiplier for the department and plays a pivotal role in the capture of suspects who run from officers.

Citizens reported at least one crash on 19 percent of road segments within the city. A road or street segment is defined as a stretch of highway with a defined block range open to public vehicular traffic within the city limits.



SPD regularly conducts checkpoints to screen drivers who may be driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol. A minimum of one check point is held quarterly at a random location within the city during periods of time when drunk driving offenses are most prevalent. Often SPD officers work with the Caddo Parish Sheriff's Office and the Louisiana State Police at these checkpoints. Over 500 intoxicated drivers were arrested in 2016. A portion of these arrests occurred at a checkpoint.

The Patrol Desk is manned 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. If you want to report an offense in person, look for this door on the northeast side of the Shreveport Police Department.




SPD worked with several city and state offices to tackle waste disposal issues within the city.

## At Work in the State and in the Community

The Community Oriented Policing Bureau staged auto crashes at local high schools to focus students on the negative consequences of drinking and driving during Operation Prom Night 2016.



SPD provided security, crowd control, and traffic control for 22 major events in the city during 2016. The Independence Bowl was one of many events supported. The list includes Mardi Gras, Louisiana State Fair, and many festivals.



SPD officers were part of the first responders answering calls for help during the March flooding in Shreveport. Later in the year, SPD sent a contingent of officers to Baton Rouge to help the rescue efforts in the August floods.




**SPD purchased 102 new vehicles in 2016 to replace an aging fleet of vehicles. These new units are now operating on the streets of Shreveport.**
